PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The largest, bloodiest, deadliest battle in Texas was fought on August 18, 1813 near the town of Leming, Texas that is just about 20 miles south of San Antonio. This battle involved the Republican Army of the North against the Spanish Empire.

Occurring during a very confused and turbulent period of world history, the Battle of Medina affected the destinies of Spain, Mexico, the United States, England, and France. Mexico and Latin America were in revolt against Spain, whose king was Joseph Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon, who was on a rampage in Europe, and the United States was at war with England, later to be called the War of 1812.



The Republican Army of the North led by Colonel Augustus Magee consisting of approximately 1,400 Tejano-Mexican and Tejano-American revolutionaries was defeated by the Spanish Royalist Troops, commanded by General Joaquín de Arredondo. Fewer than 100 of the 1,400 soldiers survived as the Spanish army killed many of the fleeing soldiers. Those who were captured were summarily executed. A young Lieutenant, Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna who fought in the bloody battle followed his superior's orders of taking no prisoners. For the Texan and Tejano soldiers in this battle, almost all of them were killed. It is unknown how many survived as the soldiers who did survive couldn't tell people that they had been a part of this fight for most of their

The Battle of Medina, as the clash in the oak grove would come to be known, was one of the deadliest and most one-sided battles in North American history, with some 1,300 of the 1,400 men of the American and revolutionary army dying in the conflict and its aftermath. Joaquín de Arredondo's Spanish forces suffered only 55 dead. The battle was also historically significant. The royalist victory helped suppress the three-year-long revolution against the Spanish colonial government that had raged across northeastern New Spain, and it put on hold hopes that Texas would be independent or become a part of the United States.

The actual battle site has never really been determined. Tom Green began holding a Commemoration Ceremony on Applewhite Road approximately 20 years ago. I was one of the first people to work with Tom as we established an annual ceremony and then later the Symposium. I went down there every year with Tom to remember these brave men in their struggle for Independence.



perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved and maintained the Independence of Texas.











Sidney Sherman Marker and Statute

A STATE OF THE STA

The Sidney Sherman Marker and Statute is located in Galveston at the intersection of Broadway and 7th street. It was erected in 1936 by the State of Texas. The sculptor for the Sidney Sherman Statute was Gaetano Cecere 1894-1985. Gaetano Cecere was an American Sculptor based in New York City and a member of the National Sculpture Society. In 1920 he won the Prix de Rome and studied at the American Academy in Rome for several years. He sculpted the model for the first version of the Distinguished Cross and later designed the Soldier's Medal.

The scabbard that holds the sword on the Sidney Sherman statute has been broken off. The chapter hopes to facilitate the repair of the statute. We are not sure where the missing piece of the statute is, or even if it sills exists. We will be contacting the Texas Historical Commission to see what the protocol is to address the repair issue and we will be reporting back to the chapter.





Texas Patriot Corner

My qualifying ancestor was Theodore Gustavus Adolphus Willis (1822-1886) who came to Texas in 1838 along with his Father, Dr. Robert Lee Willis (1799-1892) and his mother Bethunia Bostick Barner (1802-1858) and five brothers and sisters. Dr. Willis and TGA both received their Republic of Texas Land in Shelby County.


They came to the Republic of Texas from Lincoln Co. Kentucky after the banking panic of 1837, as great inducements were offered by the Republic of Texas. They came to Texas to make a new start and a new life. His father was of English and Irish parentage and his relatives were early settlers of the colonies. His mother was a French Huguenot whose relatives also came early to the colonies settling in Virginia.


Theodore married Ann Maria Bass on September 30, 1848. Her family was also early colonial settlers of Virginia, and they fought in the American Revolution against the British. TGA was a Captain in Parson's Twelfth Texas Calvary during the Civil War serving as the Regimental Quartermaster. After the war TGA served in the Texas House of Representatives representing the 15th District as he lived in Troup, Smith Co. Texas. He also served as the Immigration Commissioner for the State of Texas. The picture I believe was from the time he served in the Texas legislature. I could not find his picture at the Capital because the Capital burned. The other picture is a little older picture of TGA.


These are not my only relatives that came to early Texas. One of my relatives was James Wilder. He came from Courtland, Alabama in 1836 with Captain Dr. Jack Shackelford. James Wilder was one of the Alabama Red Rovers that perished at Goliad fighting for Texas independence. When I reenact the Goliad battle and the massacre, I participate with the Red Rovers, and I always portray James Wilder - it's a way to honor the sacrifice he made for Texas.


