


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Even for us Texans who are used to the heat, it has been one hot brutal summer and the second hottest one on record. As we look towards Fall and hopefully cooler weather soon, we are ready for our favorite sport, Texas football – Little League, Middle School, High School, College and Professional. There is something about Fall and Texas Football.

Coming up this weekend is Texian Navy Day - A Texas Honor Day, which is celebrated the 3rd Saturday in September. At the time of the Texas Revolution there were four ships in the Texian Navy - The Independence, Flagship of the Texas Navy; The Liberty, the Brutus and the Invincible. The Texian Navy was tasked with protecting the Gulf Coast, the shipping lanes and disrupting communications from Mexico to Santa Anna. During the Spring of 1836, Captain William Brown of the *Liberty* was on its way to the Yucatan when it captured the armed merchant ship, the *Pelican*. The *Liberty* also captured the *Durango*.



Captain's Brown's brother Jeremiah Brown who commanded the *Invincible* captured the *Pocket* and the *Montezuma*. Because of the efforts of the Texian Navy, over 300 kegs of gunpowder, other military supplies and reinforcements were on board the ships destined for the Mexican Army. Thus, General Houston and his Texas Army benefitted from the flour, rice, lard, biscuits and 300 kegs of powder shortly before San Jacinto. So, if we had not had the Texas Navy – the Mexican Army might not have been deprived of supplies and the reinforcements it so desperately needed.



The Texas Navy Flag was created by Charles Hawkins for the Texas Navy in April 1836. The Lone Star and Stripes Flag was adopted and continued unchanged for the life of the Republic. At the time this flag was created the Republic of Texas did not have its own flag. It carried a single white star in the blue canton and seven red stripes and six white stripes alternating in color. The flag was deliberately designed to resemble the national flag of the U. S. When the flag hung limp, it could be mistaken for the US Flag which gave the underdog Texas fleet the advantage of surprise and it worked.

The next few weeks promises to be a busy time as there are several events. First is Texian Navy Day sponsored by The Sons of the Republic of Texas this Saturday, September 16. The ceremony will be held at the Monument at 10:00 a.m. The next Honor Day will be Gonzales Day, October 2. In addition, there will be the Come and Take It Celebration, October 6, 7 and 8. The San Jacinto Museum will be sponsoring its Lecture Series, History under the Star on September 30, 2023 from 5:30 p.m. -7:00 p.m. The speaker will be Lora-Marie Bernard and her topic is *The Yellow Rose of Texas: The Song, Emily West and the Great Texas Myth*.

In addition, **Albert Seguin** and the Seguin family will be honoring their ancestor, Colonel Juan Seguin's lifetime service to the land of his birth: Texas. The event will be October 7, 2023 at 11:00a.m. at Juan Seguin Historical Park, 4407 Independence Parkway, La Porte, Texas. Three memorial medallions from the DRT, SRT and San Jacinto Descendants will be unveiled.


I hope that each of you will be able to attend some of these events as we continue our mission:

Jodi Wright-Gidley was born and raised in Conroe, Texas. Her love of history began in her early childhood when she would visit museums with her family. Deciding this would be the career path she would take, Jodi attended Baylor University as a first-generation college student and received a Bachelor's degree in Museum Studies and Archeology, Cum Laude in 1995. She continued her education at Sam Houston State University and received a Master's degree in History, with a focus on Women and Family History in 2006. One of the highlights of her education was an internship at the Smithsonian in Washington D.C.

In 2007 she became the Director of the Galveston County Historical Museum and managed operations until 2011, through the museum's closure in 2008 due to Hurricane Ike. Until her later return, she was Executive Director of the Santa Fe Texas Education Foundation, then a Major Gifts Officer for College of the Mainland's Institutional Advancement Foundation. In 2022 the Galveston County Museum reopened in its new location inside of the Galveston County Courthouse and Jodi resumed her role as director.



Texas Patriot Corner

My name is Tim W. Rainey. This is a brief history of my qualifying Republic of Texas Ancestors.

My great great great grandfather was Dr. Charles W. Rice. He was born in 1804, died in 1838. He was from New York, and first came to Texas in 1837. He applied for 1,280 acres of land and then brought his family to Texas in 1838. Dr. Rice was one of the signors of the petition for the first Masonic Lodge for Matagorda, Tx on June 24, 1838. Records show that Dr. Rice served as a surgeon in the Texas Navy during the War for Independence.

Eleanor Madden Rice was born on December 30, 1827. She married Elsy Harrison in 1857. He was born in 1810 in Kentucky. Elsy participated in the Battle of Velasco on July 25, 1832. Records show that he owned land near Cedar Lake (Matagorda County), Texas – he was a planter. Elsy bought the Samuel Rhodes Fisher home in Matagorda on June 2, 1860, for \$1,600 from Samuel's widow. The home was completed in 1832. After Elsy died, his brother-in-law, Hugh S. Stapp was made administrator of his estate and sold the home in 1872 at the courthouse steps for \$200 to Samuel Williams Fisher, son of Samuel Rhodes Fisher (past Secretary of the Navy).

Dr. Rice had twin daughters, Eleanor Madden Rice and Elizabeth Mars Rice. When the Rice twins were 8 yrs. old, they were on the boat bringing the Twin Sisters Cannons (unnamed at that time) from New Orleans. They were donated by Cincinnati, Ohio to the Liberty of Texas, destination – Brazoria, Texas. There, an admirer said "look, two sets of twins" referring to the cannons and the Rice twins. The name stuck for the cannons.




Samuel Rhoades Fisher Home Built 1832




Eleanor's twin, Elizabeth Mars Rice was the first born – born in 1827, died in 1909. She married Hugh S. Stapp on November 10, 1850. Hugh S. Stapp was born in 1822 in Kentucky. He fought in the Texas Republic Army in 1836, at the young age of 15. The couple had 7 children, one of which was Elsie Harrison Stapp. She was born on January 5, 1864. She married James H. Rainey in Brazoria County; he was my great grandfather. They had 10 children, one of which was my grandfather, Archie Campbell Rainey.

Going back to the Twin Sister Cannons

- 1. They were first used in the battle of San Jacinto; it was a great surprise to Santa Anna. He thought we did not have any cannons.
- 2. In 1840, the cannons were moved to Austin. They were used to celebrate San Jacinto Day.
- 3. After Texas joined the union, the twin sister cannons were sent to Louisiana by General Zachery Taylor to be sold as old iron. One went to the foundry, the other went to a private individual.
- 4. On March 4, 1861, instead of being scrapped, the cannons were reconditioned and returned to Texas for protection during the war between the states.
- 5. During the Civil war struggle for Galveston, the Island Confederates wanted the sister cannons back. General Magruder was sent by the South to take them back. He did and held them until the end of the war in 1865. Sidney Sherman's son, Sidney A. Sherman was killed and fell beside his gun (one of the twin sister cannons).
- 6. It was reported that in August 1865, General Magruder's soldiers came upon the twin sister cannons on a dock, where they were being sent North for scrap. They buried the cannons near Harrisburg, and they have never been found.


