#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In the Fall of 1835, following the Battle of Gonzales, **The Consultation** began its first meetings at San Felipe de Austin. The Consultation grew out of a proposed meeting of Texas representatives to confer on the prerevolutionary quarrel with Mexico. This idea was first advocated by opponents of revolution in the early summer of 1835 in Mina Municipality. Moderate and radical elements endorsed the concept to present a unified front. Though originally set for October 15th, the Consultation was delayed until November 1st by the eruption of military hostilities earlier in the month, at the insistence of delegates-elect and



army officers. On October 16th, thirty-one members assembled at San Felipe and recognized the legitimacy of a Permanent Council for a two-week period. Enough of the delegates gathered on November 1st to begin deliberations, but no actual quorum existed until the fourth. They chose Branch T. Archer, who fought at the Battle of Gonzales and was the Representative from Brazoria County to preside.

Three issues dominated The Consultation deliberations—the purpose of the war, the power and structure of government, and the virtues of different leaders. The Declaration of November 7, 1835, adopted by The Consultation at San Felipe, was a declaration of causes for taking up arms against Mexico preliminary to the Texas Declaration of Independence. Since hostilities had already begun and troops were marching against San Antonio, The Consultation had to justify the war. The peace party in Texas, however, feared that Mexican Federalists would interpret the movement as secession and unite with other Mexicans against them. The declaration had to be a strategic document, which would justify Texas action in the eyes of the rest of the world and at the same time convince the Federalists that the Texans desired only to preserve the Mexican Constitution of 1824. The Consultation President Branch T. Archer called for a committee of twelve to draft a declaration and named John A. Wharton as chairman. Preliminary plans by Daniel Parker, Don Carlos Barrett, Robert M. Williamson, and Stephen F. Austin were used in framing the declaration.

On November 26, 1835, just south of San Antonio de Béxar in the Mexican region of Texas, the **Grass Fight** was a small battle, fought between the Mexican Army and the Texian Army. After the Texian Army rejected commander-in-chief Stephen F. Austin's call to launch an assault on Béxar on November 22nd, Austin resigned from the army. The men elected Edward Burleson as their new commander-in-chief.

October has been a very active month for our Chapter. The Burnet-Sherman Marker Ceremony held on October 17th, was a most successful event. Approximately 70 Sons and Daughters along with the schoolchildren from the David G. Burnet Elementary School gathered for this event as we honored these two Texas Patriots. I appreciate everyone's participation in this event.

I want to personally thank everyone who participated in the Road to Independence, Celebrate our Heritage event sponsored by the Children, Daughters and Sons of the Republic of Texas. Robert Schnuriger made the Chili for our Chapter's team, which was recognized as the Best Texas Trail Riders Chili. Christie Erickson, Honorary Member had a Chili Team and I had a Chili Team with my grandchildren. Our district representative, Robyn Davis also had a Chili Team. Robert Gindratt and Ron Schoolcraft hosted our historic artifact table with games from the 1830's. The Sidney Sherman Chapter was well represented as J.B Kline and Albert Seguin also attended. Eron Tynes, Honorary Member managed the event and said it was a most successful afternoon. It was a wonderful day as we gathered with other Texians, enjoyed good food, and kindred fellowship.



#### Sidney Sherman Chapter October Meeting

Our speaker in October was Charles Hebert who came in character of the Republic time to discuss his book "On the Run". Charles has written several books based on his research of early Texas History covering from the mid-1820s to late-1830s. His research included analyzing the journals of Alexander Horton who was an aide to General Houston and a man named Pena who was with General Santa Anna from late 1835 through mid-1836.

Charles indicated that the winter of 1835 was particularly harsh. He said the Alamo in Bexar had changed hands from Federalist to Texian several times before the assault of that Mexican Army under Santa Anna in March, that it was his choice to chase Houston, leaving the bulk of his army in several locations. Charles then literally walked us through the movements leading to the confrontation on April 21st at San Jacinto.

President Hill reported that the attendance was excellent at the dedication of the Medallions at Juan Seguin Park. The gathering at the Monument to Burnet and Sherman in Lakeview Cemetery held this very morning was also a great success with the school children from David G. Burnet Elementary School and members of the Sidney Sherman Chapter, DRT

## Keeping Texas History Alive Burnet - Sherman Marker Graveside Geremony

The annual Burnet-Sherman Grave Marking Ceremony was held on October 17, 2023 at Lakeview Cemetery. While the Daughters of the Republic of Texas was founded in 1891, the first monument to "keep their memory green" was planned by the first chapter of the Daughters – the Sidney Sherman Chapter in Galveston.

This monument was originally dedicated on March 2, 1894. Governor Lubbock came along with The Texas Veterans, the Daughters and many civic organizations. There was a procession to the cemetery with over 2000 persons. The monument was unveiled by little Sue Sherman Menard, a granddaughter of General Sherman.

This was the first step taken by any DRT chapter toward the eventual objective of marking the resting place of all Texas heroes, setting aside those places where Texas history was made and designating such with monuments.

As we honored David G. Burnet, Interim President of the Republic of Texas and General Sidney Sherman we are indebted to the Daughters and especially the Sidney Sherman Chapter for their dedication and perseverance.

To mark the graves and forever perpetuate the bravery and courage of these Texas Heroes of ours.





## Texas Patriot Corner




This month's Patriot Ancestor is John Nichols. His descendant is Steve Manis, KSJ, Treasurer General, SRT

Here is his story in first person.

My name is John Nichols and I was born in Lauderdale County, Mississippi in 1794. In my early years I moved to Point Coupee Parish, Louisiana, just northwest of Baton Rouge on the Mississippi River. I served in the United States Army in the war of 1812. During the war, I served as a Private in Captain John R. Goffe's Company of the Louisiana Militia as a substitute for Simon Holden for which I received a fee of \$300.

It was at this point that I made contact with Jean and Pierre Lafitte and James and Rezin Bowie. Trading slaves along the Mississippi River was a questionable trade at the time and was not conducted without the approval of the Lafitte brothers and the Bowie Brothers.

As a 23-year-old man in 1817, I had a reputation as being an honest man to conduct business with. It was that year I conducted a transaction for 30 slaves for a total sum of \$30,000 (approximately \$700,000 in today's money).






In 1827, there was a major flood along the Mississippi River, the whole town of Point Coupee was washed away and I made my way for Texas and a new life! I crossed over into Texas at Sabine Pass. It wasn't long after arriving in Texas that I met Nancy Jane "Fanny" Waldrop, and we performed a ritual called "Jumping The Broom". This was an act where a couple would Jump over a Broom and was considered married until the closest Alcalde would come to the nearest town and perform marriage ceremonies for the people in that area that needed a legal ceremony.

Our ceremony was performed on October 27, 1837, prior to that date, the closest Alcalde was 200 miles away in San Antonio. Our marriage was the 27<sup>th</sup> recorded in Austin County after the Texas Revolution, and the Republic had been established! As a result of our marriage, Fanny and I had 7 children of our own, Ellen, Thomas, Sarah Jane, James W., Samuel Houston, Fannie E. and Mary Caroline "Carrie".

I applied for and received a Mexican Land Grant for 1 league (4,428.3 acres) in Austin's Second Colony, dated September 20, 1832. In 1834, I sold half of my league of land to James and Thomas Bell for \$200. On part of the land purchased by the Bell brothers, the present-day township of Bellville is now located! In 1836 when Texas became a Republic, I requested and received a 1st Class Certificate (#115) for 1 Labor (177 acres) in Austin County.









John Nichols died March 3, 1864, near Bellville. His obituary was published in the *Bellville Countryman* on March 10, 1864. "He was One of Jackson's men at the Battle of New Orleans."

This past Saturday, November 11<sup>th</sup>, the *Our Father of Texas* event was held at San Felipe de Austin State Park, celebrating the 200-year founding. In 1823, John McFarland operated a ferry on the Brazos River near this location. In the fall of the same year, the site was chosen by Stephen F. Austin, with the help of Felipe Enrique Neri, Baron de Bastrop, to be the main site in Texas for American colonization. Founded in 1824 as San Felipe de Austin, the town served as the capital of Stephen F. Austin's first colony and the founding site of the Texas Rangers.
